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Press Release from South Kesteven District Council

Tell us about changes to your circumstances

Households in South Kesteven are being urged to tell the council if there are changes in their circumstances that affect their council tax discount.

SKDC gives a 25 per cent council tax discount to around 20,000 households where there is only one adult living at the property.

The council will shortly be comparing its council tax information with other databases to identify cases where more than one adult is living at an address and a discount is still being claimed.

SKDC's Cabinet Member for Finance, Councillor Adam Stokes, said: "We believe most council tax discounts are claimed honestly and legitimately, but we know there are times where a household's circumstances change and people forget to tell us their eligibility to a discount should be ended.

"However, it is a statutory requirement for council taxpayers to inform us within 28 days if they think they should no longer qualify for a discount.

"If you receive a discount you think you should not receive, this is your final chance to tell us, before we contact you."

Councillor Stokes said the council tax scheme is a form of tax, and the council is obliged to amend any incorrect records back to the date of the change.

This means that householders do not benefit from withholding information and it makes the system fair for everyone. It could mean some households have a considerable amount of council tax arrears to pay.

Cllr Stokes added: "While we are cracking down on the incorrect discounts granted, we are still keen to make sure that everyone gets the discounts they are entitled to. You should also contact us if you think you should qualify for any discounts and exemptions."

Technology

There's a world of technology out there that can support visually impaired people to live more independently. Here we're just going to focus on apps and have selected six of our favourites...

 Be My Eyes is a relatively new app that connects blind people with sighted volunteers from around the world via live video chat. A visually impaired person requests assistance through the app with something they need help with, which could be anything from knowing the expiry date on the milk to navigating new surroundings.

- 2. **BeSpecular** is very new and works in a similar way to Be My Eyes by recruiting sighted volunteers but the visually impaired person takes a photo of what he or she needs help with and attaches a voice message.
- 3. **TapTapSee** is a mobile camera application for iOS users. The app uses the iDevice's camera and VoiceOver functions to photograph objects and identify them out loud for the user. From the app you simply double tap on the device's screen to photograph any two or three dimensional object at any angle and it will be analyzed, and defined within seconds.
- 4. **Overdrive** allows you to borrow eBooks, audiobooks, and more from your local public library anywhere, anytime.
- 5. **Wayfindr** explores the potential of audio wayfinding systems in various environments. They are currently working with London Underground to set up the system there but hope to work with all transport systems, venues, hospitals, shopping centres, etc,
- 6. **Aipoly** uses artificial intelligence to identify objects. You don't need to take pictures the app constantly sees and thinks. It knows several hundred objects right off but can also learn new objects.

What is your experience of using these Aps? Have they been helpful? Have they been easy to use? We are interested in your experience and would love to hear from you.

Accessible banking information from RNIB.

It is fast becoming a priority of the big high street bank branches to make their services more accessible for people who have specialist needs, such as sensory loss. But not all banks are created equal in terms of accessibility - and how do you know who provides the best services for you? Connect member Deanne O'Connor, who is deafblind, investigates some of the bigger banks.

"Banking is something we use on an everyday basis, either to pay our bills, or pay for our shopping, and have our salary/benefits paid into every week/fortnight/month depending on how often you receive your money. But how accessible are the different banks for blind and partially sighted people?

Well, we may be soon faced with less 'real' bank branches than ever. There has been the suggestion that if the UK are to leave the EU, it's not going be beneficial for banks to stay in the UK; "Banking is probably more affected by Brexit than any other sector of the economy", the head of the British Bankers' Association has warned. Now this will lead to uncertainty to where our banks are going to be based in future, so the question that needs to be asked, is our local branches going to be closed? As 2017 is set to be a record year for high street bank closures, the answer is probably yes.

Although online and mobile phone banking transactions have <u>increased by more than 400 percent</u>, sometimes it is still necessary to visit a real branch with accessible features.

I decided to research into accessibility at banks for blind and partially sighted customers, so I made visits to high street bank branches in my local area and wrote emails to relevant banks' head offices about their accessibility. It would seem only certain banks serve limited amount of accessibility to a certain point and some won't go the extra mile to help us."

Deanne's verdict on the most accessible banks Barclays

In 2011 Barclays became the first major bank to sign up to our <u>Make Money Talk</u> campaign. Deanne says: "Barclays Bank informed me that there is accessibility assistance for anyone who needs help with

their banking needs, abled or disabled, so in a way I suppose they have been as inclusive as possible."

Their accessible services include:

- Audio cash machines
- Contactless Cash machines (trial at the moment)
- Braille, large print and audio communications
- Cheque, credit-slip and card-signing templates
- Large-print credit and cheque books
- Post office banking if you don't have a branch based near you
- Signature stamp
- **Telephone Banking** They are offering voice biometrics within telephone banking using the customers' voice print which is unique to every customer as added security measure.
- bPay
- Accessible online banking app independently accredited by Ability net for their accessibility. Touch ID is available on IOS compatible devices – its authentication within the app (using your unique fingerprint). This is useful because it means that you can pay for things without having to see a pin pad.
- Android Mobile App tapping the NFC reader on kiosk to make withdrawals with the app with fully compatible Talk-Back for extra convenience, security and accessibility. This isn't available yet on Apple, but they are working tirelessly to bring the similar feature to the the Apple IOS smartphones at a later date.
- Twitter @BarclaysAccess. There is a dedicated accessibility
 Twitter account for you to ask questions to according to
 accessibility, and what your banking needs that are there to help
 you. Barclays Twitter is @BarclaysAccess
- bPay is a pre-paid alternative to using your card. Deanne says:
 "It's contactless and very easy to use, you just top it up from your chosen bank account and it will load money on to a band or key

fob (you select your preferred method) to use. This means that when you go out, it's a safe, secure way of paying for items without the need to use your card, especially if you are struggling to use the chip and pin."

 High visibility card Barclays has also designed a high-visibility so the card is more noticeable to those with low vision. The card is a high contrast combination of yellow and blue.

When Deanne asked for a statement, Barclays said:

"We take our accessibility commitments seriously and are actively consulting with a range of charities, customers and access consultants presently on new innovations, such as voice interfaces for banking, further cash machine personalisation options, and alternative formats for the digital age." (Jo Higginson, Customer & Client Accessibility Strategic Transformation Barclays UK C&CE)

Natwest

NatWest provide accessibility almost like Barclays apart from the bPay service.

Their accessible services include:

- Talking cash machines (coming soon)
- Accessible banking app <u>accredited by RNIB</u>
- Accessible debit card produced with RNIB. The debit card
 has purple background, and a carved out notch on the side of the
 card, with raised dots, it has a contactless sign, with NatWest's
 logo and visa debit also stated on the card.
- Touch ID accessibility for their <u>mobile app on IOS</u>, and the Android mobile app with NFC.

- Audio Cash Machine Raised dot on the number 5, Coloured keys for 'entry' and 'error', A depression in the middle of the keys making the keys easier to press.
- Accessible Correspondence Statements and general correspondence produced in Braille, large print or on audiotape, brochures produced in Braille, large print or on audiotape, PIN numbers provided in Braille
- Signature stamps
- Cheque templates
- Accessible website features bigger buttons, easier to navigate

What accessible services are available from other banks? Deanne says: "I did visit Lloyds TSB, to ask them about their accessibility and it would seem that Lloyds TSB weren't very helpful really for blind and partially sighted people, as all they can provide is braille/audio statements.

They do have mobile banking and cash machines with headphone jacks on them, and bigger screens, but I can't tell if they have upgraded their machines recently from my own experience. When contacted about their online banking accessibility, they were unavailable for comment.

Halifax provides Touch ID for their Apple iOS Mobile Banking App. I also noticed that after my recent visit to Halifax they have invested in new cash machines, that have headphone jack for blind and partially sighted customers which are easy to use, but I have noticed the staff need to brush up on their accessibility skill set I think.

I think high street banks in general need to do more to be accessible and better support blind and partially sighted people through technology."

9 things I've learnt about applying makeup with a visual impairment

Emily Davison is completely blind in one eye and has limited sight in the other, but that doesn't stop her from doing her makeup daily.

Let's be honest. Who *hasn't* smudged their mascara or made their eyeliner too thick?

I love makeup, like a lot of people. But unlike many, the reason for my occasional slip-ups is because I can't actually see what I'm doing. I write a blog called <u>Fashioneyesta</u>, which I created in 2012 as a place to talk fashion, beauty and living with a visual impairment.

I have a congenital condition called Septo Optic Dysplasia, and one of the things it impacts is my sight. I'm fully blind in my right eye and only have central vision in my left. I also have a condition called Nystagmus, which makes my eyes wobble involuntarily meaning I have difficulty focusing... not the best combo when you're trying to apply liquid eyeliner!

There does seem to be a bit of a myth that people with visual impairments can't apply makeup, or "shouldn't" care about makeup just because we can't see. But tell *that* to my visually impaired followers who ask me for makeup advice, and post pictures of their makeup looks online before a night out.

I started wearing makeup at around 14 and now, at the age of 23, I've developed some useful hacks that may help if you also struggle to apply makeup.

1. It's all about the prep

When you live with sight loss, some of the more intricate things like applying mascara and doing your brows can prove to be a very painstaking task. So I make a point of getting my eyebrows tinted and threaded and my eyelashes tinted each month. It saves so much time and needless hassle in the mornings when I'm applying my makeup. Of course, I still add a touch of mascara for volume and length.

2. The most sacred tool

For me, the most useful and easy tool to have when you can't see is a blending sponge. They work well for blending in base products like foundation, concealer and other cream products. They also work well to correct mistakes and, unlike some brushes, you won't get streaks after using it. When you can't see intricate details, you need products that allow you to blend your makeup easily.

3. Creams over powders

If you have a visual impairment, cream or liquid products tend to be easier when you're just starting out. This is because you don't get any fallout, and you can apply them with your fingers. There are plenty on the market, including blushers, highlighters, bronzers and eyeshadows.

With eyeshadows, creams are especially easy to use; you can tap a little onto your eyelid and simply blend with your finger. Then, as you get more confident, add in some powder eyeshadow and get used to a new technique.

4. The camera on your smartphone makes a great magnifying mirror It may sound strange, but actually using the camera on your smartphone to zoom in on intricate details works perfectly if you have limited eyesight.

This is a hack I developed after having a difficult time applying eyeliner to my "blind side". I got my phone, lined the camera up with my eye, put it on live video mode and zoomed in. Bingo! It worked!

5. Eyeliner hacks

One of the most commonly asked questions I get from my followers is: "How do you do your eyeliner when you can't see?"

If you practice enough it does become second nature. But there are some hacks I swear by:

- Begin by using an eyeliner pencil. This gives you more control
 when you're holding it, and if you make a mistake you can always
 smudge it in to create a smokey look.
- When applying your eyeliner, try to look downwards. This helps to keep your eye muscles taut (especially if you have Nystagmus).
- Hold the eyeliner stick horizontally along the lash line. By doing this you get as close to the lash line as possible and it's easier to glide the eyeliner along.
- If you want to do a winged liner, use tape as a guide. It's a trick I
 learned on Instagram. You take a piece of tape and place it from
 the outer corner of your eye going up diagonally towards the end
 of your brow, then apply your eyeliner along the line of the tape.

This trick works so well because the tape acts as a stencil for where to apply the eyeliner, even if you can't see it.

6. Avoiding mascara mishaps

To prevent my mascara from smudging, I fashion my own "mascara shield". I simply take a cotton pad, fold it in half, and place it underneath my eyes to do the bottom lashes. Then I place it lightly on my eyelid when working on the top lashes. It acts as a guard to help prevent your mascara smudging while you apply it.

7. What to do if you go overkill

Not sure if you applied too much contour or blush? Lightly blend over the area with the same applicator you used to apply your foundation or concealer. Any excess product on the brush will help you to blend everything seamlessly.

8. Use a lip brush to apply lipstick

When I apply a lip product I always apply it bit by bit with a lip brush. It makes it easier to blend and outline my lips without going over the lip line or using too much. I start from the centre and blend it out to the outline of my lips.

9. Ask for help

You can watch <u>YouTube videos</u>, or you can ask advice. But sometimes the best way to learn the technique of applying makeup is to actually have someone apply the makeup for you, and explain what they're using and how they're applying it. This way you really get to tangibly feel where the makeup is being applied. There are lots of <u>beauty counters</u> where you can get free consultations, or you could ask your friends to make an evening of it where you all practice on each other.

Those are some of my tips for how to do your makeup when you have a visual impairment. One thing I've learnt about living with a disability is that you become very good at problem solving and getting around obstacles. Makeup is and should be something for everyone to enjoy regardless of whether you can see or not. We all deserve to look and feel our best.
