Future of our Audio recordings of SLBS Newsletters and information.

"We hope you appreciate and enjoy listening to the audio newsletter. You may have noticed that the voices reading it have changed recently. Behind the scenes, there are new technical volunteers involved in taking the workload off Malcolm's shoulders and improving production quality.

"We currently produce three types of media; Cassette tapes which have been used for decades; Compact Disc, which were intended to replace Cassette and have been in use for over 10 years and in 2018 we've added USB memory sticks.

"The Cassette and Compact Disc recording equipment is becoming unreliable and is extremely expensive to maintain or replace. Duplicating is taking much longer than it used to because we have to quality-check each Cassette tape (many are wearing out), and two of our three Compact Disc duplicators are so unreliable we sometimes get more failed recordings than good.

"Overall the production process for these is becoming more challenging and expensive in time and materials. Typically, it can take more than eight hours to produce the newsletter you are listening to now.

"In contrast, using the new USB memory sticks, they are much more reliable, we can duplicate 20 times faster, and they are reusable (unlike Compact Discs). An added advantage is we can include more articles and entertainment; such as this newsletter where we've shared recordings from our Grantham's Got Talent choir event at St Wulfrum's church in Grantham.

"So, we'd like your help in switching to USB memory sticks where-ever possible.

"You may already have a playback device that can use USB memory sticks.

If not, it may be possible to obtain a loan device from the charity 'Wireless for the Blind' for those who are eligible. To find out if you are eligible please call our helpline on 01476 592775.

Alternatively we can advise you on purchasing a Sonic USB talking book player, prices are available from the office by calling 01476 592775.

"If you can help us be more efficient and keep cost down by changing to returnable USB and would like to switch to receiving the newsletter on USB memory stick please call the telephone help-line on 01476- 592775" Thank you your help is appreciated and please remember to return all the memory sticks and tapes by just popping them in a post box turning the address label over to show the charity address so that we can record the next newsletters on them.

A short story for Battery safety and storage

We were awoken to a fire in our kitchen last night (2:30 am) and thankfully, for the smoke alarms, we were able to get out in time. The

response crews were amazing and even gave the kids each a teddy because their stuff was smoky.

The fire started in the drawer in our kitchen island from 2 batteries that were touching at the male end. The batteries were in a drawer with dish towels, which ended up catching fire. We have always stored our batteries this way and didn't realize the danger. Please everyone check how your batteries are stored and ensure there are no flammable items close to them. The fire inspector told us batteries should be stored in a container and all standing upright. If your batteries are in packaging it's ok, it's when you have loose ones thrown together that they become a danger.

We are so thankful that we got out quick and the fire didn't spread. We can't even imagine if we weren't home or if the smoke alarms didn't wake us. Thank you to everyone who has offered to help and we really just want to use this experience to make sure you store your batteries in a safe way so this doesn't happen to anyone else!

Help if you live in South Kesteven?

People with disabilities living in private housing could get free adaptions to their homes.

They can now apply for the full cost of stair lifts and modular access ramps (up to £7,000of Government funding) to help the access their home. The change to the discretionary disabled facilities grants will run until April 1st.

South Kesteven District Council cabinet member for housing Councillor Nick Neilson said "work like this can increase independence - help faster discharge from hospital, reduce the need for support from social care and health care services and also prevent further deterioration in people's existing conditions. If someone has a referral from the occupational therapist for a stair lift or modular access ramp, they would have previously been means tested, which could mean they would have to make a contribution towards the cost of the work or they may not be eligible for any assistance. We know that people can fail the government set means test and yet still not have the money to pay for this work, which is why we are changing the way this works. For more details call 01476 406080.

Phone app allows volunteers to be eyes of visually impaired.

Video call help scheme has grown into a worldwide success, writes Faith Eckersall.

Imagine you are blind or partially sighted, and you need to choose a suit for a job interview. Or you want to check the use-by date on a pint of milk, but your eyesight is too poor to see the numbers properly.

You could wait for a friend to come and help – or you could make a video call using the Be My Eyes app, through which you'll ask a willing stranger to help you.

Every day we hear of a different way that people are using the app'. Says Alexander Hauerslev Jenson, one of the team running Be My Eyes from its base in Denmark. The idea was sparked in 2012 by visually impaired craftsman Hans Jorgen Wiberg, who heard about blind and partially sighted people using video calls to connect to sighted family members. 'He thought it would be great if you could connect to a bunch of other people because there are things you don't always want to share with friends and family, and you have to decide who to disturb each time' says Jensen. Within 24 hours of its launch in January 2015, more than 10,000 people from 40 countries had volunteered to join the project. Now Be My Eyes is active in 150 countries, has more than 100,000 users and more than 1.6 million volunteers, who between them speak 185 languages.

Tasks that the app has been able to help with have ranged from guiding someone out of a tunnel to checking a bride's gown before she walked down the aisle.

One user is Santiago, Chile, was amazed when a man in Israel pulled his car over to help him find a lost document.

It works like this: sighted volunteers sign up and when a user calls, they answer if it's safe to do so – not while driving, for example – and try to help. A number of volunteers are contacted at once in case people are busy. And because there are volunteers in many time zones, there will almost certainly be someone to assit a user, even in the middle of the night, says Jensen.

'Every day we get emails, tweets and calls from our volunteers' he says. 'Some even cry because they have helped someone out with something very simple. 'It's gratifying to help someone like this, and I think this is why the app's gone viral, although one of our volunteers put it best when she said: "Be My Eyes is a good deed waiting to happen in your pocket."

Warming winter recipe.

Beef and Guinness Casserole.

Serves 4

Skill Effortless

Prepare 25 mins Cook 1 hour 30 minutes

Ingredients

- 2 tbsp oil
- 450g (1lb) stewing steak, cut into cubes
- 2 onions, sliced
- 1 tbsp plain flour
- 2.5cm (1in) piece of root ginger, grated
- 150ml (1/4pt) brown ale or Guinness
- 1 KNORR Beef stock Pot dissolved in 150ml (1/4pt) boiling water
- 400g can tomatoes or passata
- Bouquet garni
- 1 red pepper, sliced
- 1 orange, rind and juice

Method

- 1. Heat 1tbsp of oil in a pan over a medium heat and fry the meat until it has browned. Removed from the pan and put into a casserole dish.
- 2. Heat the remaining oil and sauté the onion over a low heat until golden. Mix in the flour and ginger, cook for 1-2 minutes, then gradually stir in the ale, stock and tomatoes and cook until thickened. Add the bouquet gami, pepper and orange rind and pour into the casserole.
- 3. Cook in a preheated oven 160° c/ 140° c fan/ Gas 3 for $1\frac{1}{2}$ hours.
- 4. Removed the bouquet garni, stir in the orange juice then serve.

This casserole also makes a delicious pie. Place the cooked meat in a pie dish and cover with ready – rolled puff pastry.

Does the name William Moon Mean anything to you?

If you are anything like the ninety or so people I have asked within the last few days, you will probably say "No why should it?

When he reached the age of four years, he suffered from scarlet fever, which left him with impaired vision and by the age of twenty-one years, he had become totally blind in both eyes. This devastating situation meant that he would not be able to fulfil his life's ambition to become a non-conformist Minister. What could he do? His prospects must have seemed very dark. However, as a man of faith he poured out his troubles and disappointment to God in prayer. This eventually had a wonderfully calming effect on him. Eventually he began to realise that God had entrusted him with a new talent which he could accept and offer for the blessing of other blind and partially sighted people. So it became his prayer that God would use his TALENT OF BLINDNESS.

During the dark time he was passing through following the discovery that he would never see again, an unknown lady called upon him to invite him to her home for lessons to read (by touch) by a system of raised type invented by a person named Freear. William was delighted and gladly accepted her offer. As he mastered this new skill, he also began to gain experience of other methods of reading by touch. He became aware that other blind and partially sighted people had struggled and given up on them.

whereas he had discovered and overcome their inherent difficulties. This led to his own invention of a new embossed alphabet based on Roman script. He began teaching his own system to sight impaired people who were greatly helped through a school he had set up.

Next he aimed at producing Scripture portions and other literature for the blind. This was followed by the complete Bible in Moon script. He now produced similar work in numerous other languages including Chinese, Indian, Egyptian, West African, and others. Thousands of people throughout the world now began to benefit from his Vision.

Whereas at that time, to be blind rendered a person as almost useless, and many regarded them as a nuisance. Their ability to read gave them an entirely new potential.

William Moon's response to his God given Talent of Blindness resulted in thousands of people throughout the world who would otherwise be placed on life's scrap heap were given the dignity and respect which should be the birthright of every human being. Perhaps a reason why so few people seem to know about William Moon at the present time is because he would always say "To God be the glory" when anyone praised him for any of his achievements.

His birthdate was 18.12.1818 which means that 18.12 2018 is the bicentenary of his birth certainly, "To God be the glory!" As we draw near to his bicentenary, Let us give thanks to God for what He accomplished through William's talent and offer our own talent(s) to him in gratitude. "To God be the Glory!"

Boston & South Holland Talking Newspaper

We provide a free weekly audio recording of local news on a memory stick, dispatched free post to visually impaired people under Articles for the Blind Legislation.

A variety of news is drawn from the Boston Standard or Target and Lincolnshire Free Press. From time to time we include recordings on useful topics available free to all T.N's by Info-Sound and regularly read notices about monthly meetings of local Macular Groups, the local Disability Forum and notices from South Lincs Blind Society if they provide us with items of interest.

The memory sticks can be played on any device with a USB slot – could be a Wireless for the Blind, other radio – CD player, modern TV or PC. Simple to use players <u>may</u> be available, free of charge to those who are eligible.

We cannot provide a player if you live outside of our area, although we are happy to send recordings if you are interested in news from our area.

Recordings are made on a Thursday morning and dispatched the same day, usually reaching our listeners on Friday. We plan to continue this free service for as long as there is a demand.

Sleaford and District Talking Newspaper

Our newspaper has been informing local blind and partially sighted people for over 35 years. We can thank enthusiastic members of the Sleaford Rotary Club for our birth. They advertised locally for interested people to come forward as readers and technicians.

Radio Lincolnshire provided training for the would-be readers. Adverts were also placed for redundant tape players and tapes.

In these early days recordings were made on a reel to reel recorder and then transferred to a small tape to be sent to our listeners. The tapes were returned free of charge by the Royal Mail and then had to be cleaned prior to the next week's recording. By the late 80s we were sending tapes to over 100 listeners.

The system was relatively slow and inflexible so we moved into the computer age in 2008. We considered using compact discs but made a bigger leap straight to a computerised system, which transferred our recordings onto a master USB (memory) stick.

This is then copied onto individual memory sticks and sent to our listeners.

The new system has no constraints re the length of recordings and allows the listener to select individual items to listen to rather than having to forward or reverse the tape. Our outlay of £5000 was possible due to a very generous legacy from one of our founder members.

We bought memory stick players for every listener and delivered them so we could teach them how to operate the new equipment. They all very quickly adapted. Recordings are done on the Wednesday the two local papers are published, and the copying and posting on Thursday.

Today our numbers have dwindled to less than 50. We don't know for sure why this is. We suspect it is a combination of more local news on radio and TV, potential listeners moving into the area and not interested in local news;

some listeners, particularly younger ones, access news via the internet due to computers now developed for the blind or partially sighted. We would also love to believe that these days there are fewer sufferers.

We have around 40 volunteers who belong to 5 recording teams and one admin/copying team. We recently surveyed our listeners and had a positive response re their ongoing need for our service.

Finally we welcome new listeners and are grateful to SLBS who often supply us with local people requiring our service. If you know of anyone who would like a weekly recording, or be willing to help as a reader or technician
