Your vote matters - don't lose it!

SKDC is encouraging anyone not yet registered to vote to go online and register if they want to have their say in the local elections in May.

Thursday 2 May is polling day for all 56 seats on South Kesteven District Council and 65 parish councils across the district.

Aidan Rave, Electoral Registration Officer for SKDC, said: "The good news is that the majority of our residents are registered but there are still those who have not yet done so.

"With the elections now just months away, we are encouraging residents to go online at <u>www.gov.uk/register-to-vote</u> and register, particularly those who have recently moved or will be 18 by 2 May.

"Some people wrongly assume that paying council tax means you are registered to vote. I am urging all those eligible to vote in South Kesteven to check that they are registered. Unless your name and address are correctly entered you could lose the right to have your say."

It is really simple to do. You will be asked to provide your date of birth and National Insurance number in addition to the usual details of name, address, previous address and nationality.

Remember:

The registration deadline for the elections on 2nd May is 12th April.

Beware of Fraud

HM Revenue and Customs Alert

What you need to know

Action Fraud has experienced an increase in the reporting of malicious calls, voicemails, text messages or emails to members of the public purporting to be from HMRC.

The fraudsters state that as a result of their non-payment of tax or other duty, the victim is liable to prosecution or other legal proceedings such as repossession of belongings to settle the balance but can avoid this by arranging for payment to be made immediately by method such as bank transfer or by iTunes gift cards. If the victim is hesitant or refuses to comply, the suspect makes a threat such as immediate arrest, bailiffs or in cases where the victim appears to be of overseas origin; deportation.

Often, the period for which the tax is allegedly due is distant enough to guarantee the victim will have little, if any, paperwork or ability to verify the claims. Once the money is paid the suspects sever all contact.

It is vital that the public exercise caution when receiving messages or telephone calls of this nature.

What you need to do

Always question unsolicited requests for your personal or financial information. Just because someone knows your basic details (such as your name and contact details), it doesn't mean they are genuine. Instead, contact the company directly using trusted methods such as a known email address or phone number.

Listen to your instincts. If something feels wrong then it is usually right to question it. No genuine organisation will ask you to pay taxes, bills or fees using iTunes Gift Cards, or any other type of voucher.

Don't be rushed or pressured into making a decision. Under no circumstances would a genuine bank or some other trusted organisation force you to make a financial transaction on the spot.

Report Phishing attempts. If you receive a call, text or email of this nature and have not lost money, report this as a phishing attempt to Action Fraud.

Lifeline Alarm Fraud

Message from Lincolnshire Police Headquarters, Engagement Team.

We have received a report of telephone fraud relating to the use of a lifeline alarm. An elderly Lincolnshire resident received a telephone call whereby a suspect claimed that their payment details had expired and that the victim needed to provide their card details again.

Please be aware that this is fraud — a legitimate organisation would never demand payment over the phone in this nature. Do not provide personal or bank details over the telephone. If you are unsure, then end the call immediately. For police support please call 101. For enquiries regarding your lifeline alarm please contact your local council directly.

Cold Calling – Intruder Alarms

We have been made aware by a concerned resident that an Alarm company is "cold calling" Lincolnshire residents, trying to sell them intruder alarm systems.

If you do get a sales call please be mindful of the information that you pass to them. When considering security systems for your home or business don't deal with cold callers or telesales enquiries and avoid doing doorstep or telephone business.

Many traders who call at your door are honest and genuine; however, some are not and can be extremely persuasive. If you have serious doubts about the legality or sales techniques being employed by this type of security company, or if they are using hard selling tactics which include unduly raising the fear of crime, pressure selling, unclear contracts and overpriced security systems, contact Citizens Advice about your consumer rights on 03454 04 05 06. They can also refer your complaint to Trading Standards officers who may then investigate on your behalf.

Be aware that not all costs may be shown and ask yourself, How much is:

- Installation costs, what am I getting?
- Servicing -- how much, how often?
- Have monitored upfront or monthly payments?
- How long will I pay for it, minimum 3-5 years?

Please be aware that all alarm companies that install systems in our county which promise a Police response to alarm activations must be registered with one of the two national inspectorate bodies which are the NSI and the SSAIB.

Fake TV Licensing emails

Action Fraud has received more than 5,000 reports about fake emails and texts purporting to be from TV Licensing. Although messages contain links to genuine-looking websites but are designed to steal personal and financial information.

Always question unsolicited requests for your personal or financial information in case it's a scam. Never automatically click on a link in an unexpected email or text.

Fake Calls regarding compromised phone lines

A service user who advised us of a phone call fraud has alerted us to the following. You may receive a message to say that your phone line has been compromised and to press 1 for BT and 2 for other suppliers. The service user contacted BT who informed her that it was not genuine and was a scam. So be aware.

Do you know about the Soundscape App?

Have you used it? Would you recommend it to others?

Soundscape app calls out landmarks to help people who are blind get where they need to go.

Advancements in technology can play a deep and meaningful role in the independent mobility of people who are blind or have low vision. That is why we created Soundscape, a free app available today on iOS and iPhone in the UK.

Soundscape empowers more people to explore the world around them through a 3D audio experience. The app enriches your perception of surroundings as you walk, helping you get where you want to go. Rushing between classes, going for coffee with a friend or touring a new city with the family are all common experiences that could be more rewarding and cause less anxiety for nearly 300 million people with sight loss worldwide. Microsoft's technology enables you to set audio beacons at familiar destinations and landmarks, and then use 3D audio cues to improve your ambient awareness as you make your way to the destination. By simply connecting a stereo headset, you can explore the outdoor world with more independence. With 3D audio, the sounds are perceived as coming from the point of interest, so the user can build a mental image of what's around from the sounds in the environment and the Soundscape app. Shona Black, a guide dog owner, said: "I use My Location in Soundscape, which tells me what's around me. It's amazing, it tells me all the street names that I didn't know before. One of the most useful things is that you can put in points of interest. I've put in a tower that is at the end of my street, which is really handy, and that's where I head towards for home." Soundscape has several useful features, including the ability to run in the background while you use other programs, and was designed to be used in addition to other navigation support methods such as guide dogs and canes. As you walk, Soundscape will help you stay aware of where you are by calling out roads and landmarks as you pass them. If at any point you're

unsure of where you are or which road to choose, hold the phone flat in your hand with the top edge facing the direction of interest and use the buttons at the bottom of the screen to locate nearby roads, orientate yourself to familiar landmarks and explore the places ahead of you. Tom Wright, Chief Executive of the charity Guide Dogs, said: "If you're living with sight loss, getting around towns and cities can be daunting.

Choosing where to go and what to do is an impossible dream. Soundscape will change this for many people.

"We worked with Microsoft to put people with sight loss at the heart of the development of Soundscape.

This close collaboration has resulted in an app that makes exploring towns and cities a more enjoyable experience for those with sight loss, enabling people to make spontaneous choices about where they go and what they do."

The <u>project began in 2014</u> when Amos Miller, a Microsoft product strategist and researcher in the Microsoft Research Enable team, felt that independent mobility for visually impaired people could be greatly improved with technology.

He was born with a genetic eye disease that later led to complete sight loss. Inspired by fatherhood, he sought to understand how the sense of independence, presence and empowerment might be heightened and thereby motivate many more people who are blind or have low vision to leave their home on their own.

"When someone can relate to their environment in a natural and intuitive way, it changes their relationship with their world," said Miller. "It is that relationship that brings about a sense of meaning and connection, which is so important in life."

To explore the problem, he brought together Microsoft researchers with experts from Guide Dogs UK, who help thousands of people who are blind or have low vision by providing them with specially trained dogs and mobility training.

With growing support, the Soundscape research project was established, and we began to re-imagine how technology could enhance independence and mobility.

Chris_Yates, a Lead Mobility Instructor at Guide Dogs UK, worked closely with the team on implementing Soundscape. Yates noted: "While cities have a long way to go to become truly accessible for everyone, technology helps play a significant role for people with disabilities.

Soundscape helps add more insight and information in addition to traditional mobility resources, like guide dogs and walking canes, that can help people gain confidence in how they get around their city."

For each step in the development process, gaining feedback has helped bring the research project to life.

In San Francisco, we began working with LightHouse for the Blind, a nonprofit organization that promotes independence, equality and self-reliance of people who are blind or have low vision.

Soundscape was designed to be used in addition to other navigation support methods such as guide dogs and canes.

"Obstacle avoidance is not the problem, we have a dog, a cane and our blindness skills for that," said Erin Lauridsen, Access Technology Director at LightHouse for the Blind. "The gap is knowing where things are and being able to decide what's of interest.

"At LightHouse, we know that accessible technology can play a huge role in helping more people be productive, gain confidence and become self-reliant. Soundscape addresses a crucial need – a tool for efficiently exploring your surroundings. That is a game-changer."

At Microsoft, we are on a journey to empower people with disabilities. We are focused on learning from our customers, partners and the community to continually improve our products and services. Your input and commitment to help us think about the role technology can play to empower more people has been an amazing and rewarding experience.

New website showcases Bourne CiCLE Festival

A new website has launched for Bourne's first CiCLE Festival later this year.

As activity builds towards the festival, organised by South Kesteven District Council, the web site - <u>www.bourneciclefestival.com</u> - will be constantly updated.

It carries detail on the four major cycling events taking place over the weekend (31 August - 1 September) - men's and women's elite races, a time trial and an amateur riders' sportive.

Cllr Nick Robins, SKDC Cabinet Member for Visitor Economy said: "The momentum for this event is starting to build amongst residents, businesses and the cycling community and now we have the website live to add to that.

"It's even got suggestions for how people can get involved with what promises to be an amazing event.

"We would love to see communities along the route arranging events to celebrate what's happening on their doorstep, perhaps a village BBQ, race bunting, painted or even knitted cycles along the route".

Cycling route plans are now online, with timings, car parking, and activities in Bourne over the weekend and ideas for community events along the race route.

Most of the UK's professional teams have indicated an interest in participating, with entries opening on 5 April, and the website will carry profiles on riders and teams taking part.

The sportive, run by Bourne's cycling club the Bourne Wheelers, takes place over three different distances and can be booked via an online link.

There will also be full details of events in the town, from BMX cycling displays to heritage cycles.

New veterans ID cards rolled out to service leavers

All service leavers will receive a new ID card to mark their time in the armed forces.

A new ID card for armed forces veterans, which will help them access specialist support and services, has started to be issued to service leavers.

After February 18th any personnel who have left the military since December 2018 will automatically be given one of the new ID cards, which will allow them to maintain a tangible link to their career in the forces.

The cards allow veterans to easily verify their service to the NHS, their local authority, and charities, helping them to access support and services where needed.

All other veterans will be able to apply for a new ID card by the end of this year, to mark their time in the armed forces.

Minister for Defense People and Veterans Tobias Ellwood said:

"We owe a huge debt of gratitude to the ex-forces community, and we are working hard to ensure they receive the support they deserve.

These new cards celebrate the great commitment and dedication of those who have served this country, and I hope they can provide a further link to ex-personnel and the incredible community around them." Veterans UK - which manages pensions and compensation payments for the armed forces - local authorities, service charities, NHS and GPs will also benefit from the change, as they will not have to conduct time-consuming checks to identify individual veterans.

The new ID card is one of three that are available to service leavers. Personnel leaving the armed forces are also able to keep their military IDs, known as the MOD Form 90, allowing them to maintain their emotional connection with their service. Additionally, veterans can access a range of discounts through the Defense Discount Service, the official MOD-endorsed service for the armed forces. All relevant Government departments have a responsibility to ensure that the military community is treated fairly, and not disadvantaged by their service, as part of the Armed Forces Covenant.

The new ID cards will ensure the process of validating service is as straightforward as possible, so that ex-forces personnel can access support for issues related to their service quickly, where needed.

The cards will complement the NHS' commitment to providing specialist health support for veterans in every part of the health service, enabling exservice personnel in England, Scotland and Wales to access treatment where they have been affected by their service.

Last year, NHS England announced that dedicated mental healthcare services are up and running in every part of the country, backed by £10 million of investment, with increasing numbers of GPs and hospitals becoming 'Veteran Aware', in order to fully address the needs of those who have served.

Any veteran in need of support can contact the <u>Veterans' Gateway</u> – the 24 hour service which signposts ex-forces personnel to the wide range of support available to them, including housing and financial advice, career guidance, and medical care from the NHS.

Since being set up in 2017, the Veterans' Gateway has already received over 20,000 contacts, advising ex-forces personnel and their families.
